We are beginning the planning process for **Thumbfest 2010**.

At the present time, the entire board will function as the preliminary planning team until we have filled our planning team.

At a planning and wrap-up meeting on October 25, 2009, with 12 members present, there was wide support to present another Thumbfest and some volunteers for some of the necessary roles for Thumbfest, but no overall coordinator or director stepped forward. We do, however, have some roles already filled.

Please let us know, as soon as possible, if you want a role in planning the Thumbfest 2010. Decisions about the form of a future Thumbfest will take place by January.

Thumbfest News

This is great! Is everyone in this town so happy all the time? What a wonderful place, we will have to come back! Wow, all the music is great and even the musicians are happy! This is the best music festival!

With comments like these we could have called the Thumbfest 2009 a success but now the final figures are in and we can officially call Thumbfest 2009 a financial success, which we measure by having enough "profit" to pay all the performers and our bills for the Thumbfest.

Tom Schlichting, treasurer reported that we had enough profit on the cutoff date to pay each TPS (*Thumbfest Profit Share*) individual performer \$12.78. Sanilac Consortium for the Arts board has voted to "gift" each profit-sharing musician up to the \$25 level. This \$25 figure represents BWFS dividing **all the net profit** among the performers plus a special recognition of their service from the Sanilac Consortium for the Arts.

Some of the many expenses we have for Thumbfest are the tents, portable toilets, the shuttle bus, paid performers and other items. We raise the money for the Thumbfest by sponsors, ads, benefit concerts, grants and donations. Our budget this year was \$14,600, which was greatly reduced from last year's budget.

We would like to thank our stage sponsors and venue space donors: Weekend's; Smackwater Courtyard; Lakeside A & W; iCrave Cafe; Southern Thumb Music; Virginia McNabb, realtor for Town & Country; Sugar Shack Band; Upper Level Acoustic Cafe; Mary & Ruth Habalewsky; Bill Oldford, Crazy Joe's, St. Dennis Catholic Church, the Lion's Club and Dave Reid Custom Homes for without them we would not have had venues for all the music we had.

All of our workshop presenters did a wonderful job and we have heard nothing but praise about all of them. Many of the presenters went above and beyond what they needed to do.

Carl Kammer: President

Carl Kammer currently serves as the president of the Blue Water Folk Society. He is married with two sons and a daughter-in-law.

By day he works as a management consultant with a specialization in project management for small and medium-sized businesses. But when he's not re-engineering processes or determining IT best practices, Carl indulges in his other passions: photography, cooking and music of all kinds.

His interest in music started in grade school in Detroit, when he began playing the

trombone. He kept tooting his own horn all the way into high school, where he played in the symphonic and concert bands of Cass Tech. In fact, many prominent musicians were going to Cass at about that same time, including Diana Ross and Paul Riser of Motown fame and jazz greats Paul Chambers, Donald Byrd, and Lanny Austin. They continue to serve as musical inspiration for Carl to this day.

After Cass Tech, Carl moved on to Wayne State University just as the Folk Era was starting to influence TV (Hootenany). Once again, Carl was surrounded by many future influential performers who hadn't yet

become famous, like Joni Mitchell, who would appear at WSU student mixers with her then husband Chuck.

Carl's own musical endeavors are now mostly centered at his church, where he's finally resurrected his ol' trombone. He also sings in the choir and taken to playing congas and hand percussion with the band "Transformed".

All of these experiences have resulted in a love of folk music that still burns strongly today, especially for the many fine Michigan musicians that have appeared at Thumbfest.

Mike Mercatante: Trustee

I'm Mike Mercatante. I believe I am the newest board member of the Blue Water Folk Society.

I was born and raised in Detroit (the city, not a suburb) and lived there until I moved to Wales Township in 1992 where I live with my wife, son, and assorted animals. I currently work as the branch manager of the Marysville

Public Library. I have degrees in Music Composition and Psychology from Wayne State University.

Music is a lifelong passion of mine. I have been involved with the music scene for many years. I am a guitarist and player of stringed instruments and I love to write and arrange music. I've played in bands throughout the Detroit area for

years and am now part of an eclectic, creative acoustic music duo called Still Running. I also helped manage Alvin's, one of Detroit's premier nightclubs. I have been involved with the BWFS and Thumbfest for four years.

I hope to continue to write, record, play for years to come.
